To further promote our Catholic schools' mission, all schools are evaluated using the National Standards and Benchmarks for Effective Catholic Elementary and Secondary Schools.

Congratulations to Isabella, a sophomore student at Bishop Moore Catholic High School, for receiving the 2019 Youth Virtues, Valor and Vision Award from the National Catholic Educational Association (NCEA). After spending two weeks at the Leadership Initiatives program at Georgetown University, Isabella organized a group of classmates to continue her efforts in creating education based programs to teach English to orphans in Nigeria. They are also raising funds and increasing awareness of the needs of the children. This is the second consecutive year that a Bishop Moore student has received this award.



Good Shepherd Catholic School and Melbourne Central Catholic High School were awarded the 2019 St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta Award in recognition for service projects completed during the school year. Good Shepherd students crocheted mats from recycled grocery bags to give to the homeless. MCC created a partnership with the Daily Bread Soup Kitchen in Melbourne, where students prepared meals, fed the homeless, washed and folded donated clothing, and took on various tasks that are necessary to the success of Daily Bread. MCC also held five donation drives that directly benefitted Daily Bread.

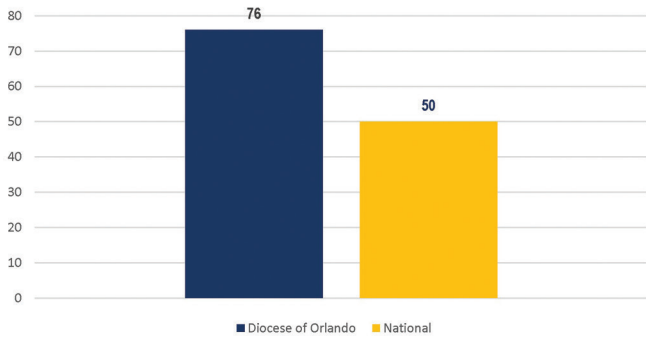

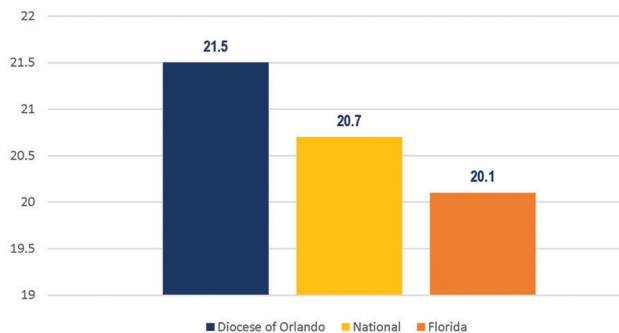

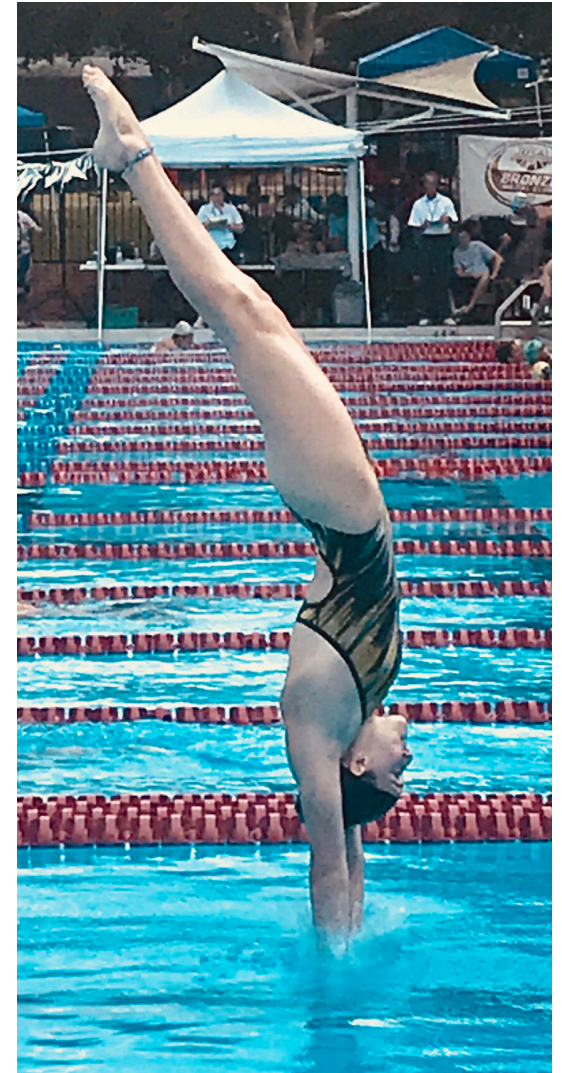

In an effort to give San Pedro a fresh, new look, we continued renovating and upgrading our conference centers and guest rooms. We are especially proud of three major projects completed in 2018-2019.

- We created two guest lounges -- one in St. Thomas the Apostle and one in St. William the Great. These rooms are for guests staying in each building, and include a new refrigerator, microwave, coffee machine, water and ice machine, and a dinette area with sofas and a television.
- St. John the Apostle Conference Center, St. William the Great and St. Thomas the Apostle guest rooms, St. Augustine Conference, St. Teresa of Avila Administration, and the Mary Mother of God Chapel each got new roofs.
- The cabins were completely renovated with new roofs, exterior siding, paint and dry wall, as well as new kitchenettes, furniture, flooring, tankless water heaters, showers, windows and HVAC units.

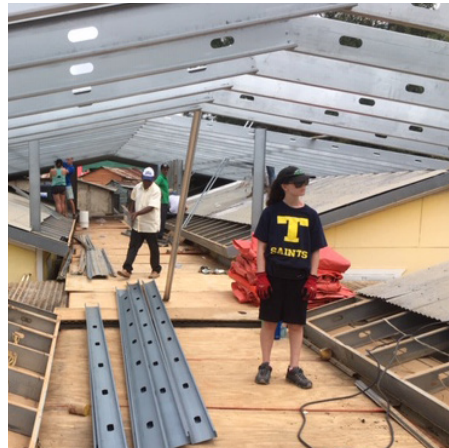

Beloved Sisters return to Ireland

After loving and teaching Catholic school children in Brevard county for more than 50 years, Sisters of Mercy, Sister Immaculata Knox and Sister Joseph Barden, decided it was time to retire. The Sisters, who embedded themselves in hearts of thousands, returned to their home in Ardee, Ireland on June 13 to live in a retirement village across from their old convent.

Sister Knox was first to arrive in Melbourne in 1961 and helped establish Ascension Catholic School. She would teach there for the next 45 years, until she became director of pastoral care at Ascension Parish—visiting the sick, incarcerated, and helping the poor.

Following suit five years later, Sister Barden arrived in Indialantic to teach at Holy Name of Jesus Catholic School. She became principal at Ascension in 1971 and remained so until 2000, when she was appointed director of development for the school.

Under her direction, Ascension Catholic School expanded with a new gymnasium, library, science lab and religious education offices. She said, “I loved working with the children, especially during the science fairs,” where she was actively involved.

In fact, the science lab was named after her due to her efforts in making the program highly recognized on the Space Coast. Sister Barden said her proudest moment was when Ascension Catholic School was selected by the U.S. Department of Education as a National School of Excellence in 1986.

Both sisters received the Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice award from Pope Francis in 2018 in honor of their work in the diocese and Catholic schools. Sister Barden received a proclamation from the City of Melbourne thanking her for her years of service at Ascension and in the community. Sister Knox was selected Brevard County Woman of the Year in Education, awarded as part of the National Women’s History Project. She was the first religious to be selected for the award.

Neither Sister plans on slowing down in her retirement. “We have a pile of adventures left,” said Sister Knox.

Jim Cooney Retires

For several years, Jim Cooney, associate superintendent of Catholic Schools, said he was going to retire, only to change his mind. After more than 50 years in education, Mr. Cooney made good on his promise, retiring on Jan. 4.

Joining the Office of Catholic Schools staff in 1994, Mr. Cooney served under four superintendents. His responsibilities centered on curriculum development and accreditation for the diocese’s 31 K-8 schools, one special needs school and five high schools. During the last two years of his tenure, he oversaw the Florida Catholic Conference accreditation of our five standalone Early Learning Centers.

Prior to the Diocese of Orlando, Mr. Cooney served as a teacher, principal, and director of guidance counseling in K-12 public and private schools, as well as at the collegiate level. He also owned and operated an early learning center.

His wife, Sandra Cooney, who came out of retirement to serve as principal at Morning Star Catholic School for five years, joined him in retirement in June.



STREAM gains momentum

Diocese of Orlando Catholic schools continue to make strides in implementing STREAM (science, technology, religion, engineering, arts, mathematics) programming into their curriculums. Building on STREAM guidelines set by the Florida, Catholic Conference, the Office of Catholic Schools introduced additional STREAM Certification standards geared specifically for our schools. Several schools have taken the steps to become STREAM certified by the diocese.

Dual High School accreditation announced

In Spring 2019, the Florida Catholic Conference (FCC) announced a new dual accreditation process for Catholic high schools in the State of Florida. Beginning in 2020, high schools will be evaluated using the National Standards and Benchmarks Effective Catholic Elementary and Secondary Schools, the same standards used in K-8 schools since 2014, when going through the seven-year accreditation process. AdvancedEd (now Cognia), the largest accrediting agency in the world that is currently the sole accrediting agency for our high schools, has agreed to honor the findings and outcome of the FCC process, thus giving our secondary schools dual accreditation recognition.

Securing a strong future for Catholic secondary schools for generations to come, the enhanced accreditation process ensures that our schools are held accountable for the “excellence and rigor, faith and nurturance that has been the hallmark of Catholic education.”

MCC partners with FIT

Melbourne Central Catholic High School (MCC) partnered with Florida Institute of Technology for the Emerging Scholars program, which will provide high school students with a solid foundation upon which to build their future. Beginning in the 2019-2020 school year, qualified juniors and seniors may enroll in Florida Institute of Technology and earn up to 24 college credit hours while attending high school.

Students with a minimum of a B average in related high school coursework, required SAT or ACT scores and a counselor recommendation will attend classes at Florida Institute of Technology in collaboration with their traditional high school classes. This makes the program different from other traditional dual enrollment type programs.

“Our students have access to all the campus amenities that traditional students have access to,” said Tessie Wilkie, communications coordinator at MCC. “This program has been available to seniors only since its inception in Fall 2014. The expansion of this program will allow qualifying juniors to participate.”

In addition to credit hours, students may be eligible to earn an honors diploma and enter college as a sophomore. They will also be guaranteed admission to a Florida Institute of Technology degree program if at least six semester credit hours have been completed with a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher.



Next generation of leaders emerge

A group of 30 teachers embarked on a journey to become the next generation of leaders in Diocese of Orlando Catholic Schools. The Office of Catholic Schools partnered with St. Leo University to establish an educational cohort for teachers interested in becoming principals in one of our Catholic schools. The cohort is comprised of some of the diocese’s top educators, as selected by the principals in our schools. While pursuing their master’s degree in Educational Leadership from St. Leo, or preparing for the next step in their careers for those already holding the advanced degree, these men and women are concurrently attending workshops led by Dr. Jacquelyn Flanigan, associate superintendent, and Jayme Hartmann, principal of St. James Cathedral School, to learn the specifics of being a principal in a Diocese of Orlando Catholic School. Lessons taught in the workshops reflect their college classroom curriculum. This is one way the diocese is looking to the future to ensure the continued strength of our schools.

Safety improvements continue

We continued to improve security on our campuses. Here is a sample of the changes made in 2018-2019:

- School/parish security vulnerability assessments were conducted to improve the overall security.
- Two way walkie-talkies provided to each school/parish to provide way to communicate emergency response quickly and effectively
- The Raptor System was installed in all K-8 and high schools. All visitors enter through a single point entry in main office and provide a driver’s license identification. They are screened through Raptor against the National Sexual Predator/Offender database. A colored lanyard system to easily identify staff, visitors, volunteers, and contractors who have been cleared for campus access was also implemented.
- Stakeholder meetings were conducted with local law enforcement and first responders in order to build community partnerships.
- School administrators and other key staff were trained in Youth Mental Health First Aid to help identify early warning signs of mental health issues in our students and intervene early with assistance.

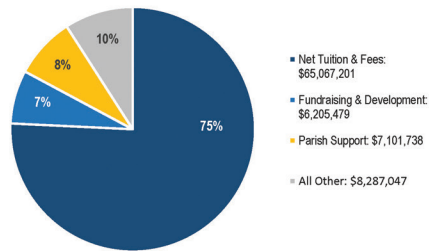

REVENUE

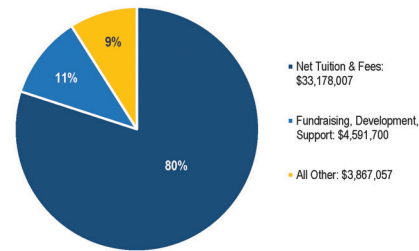

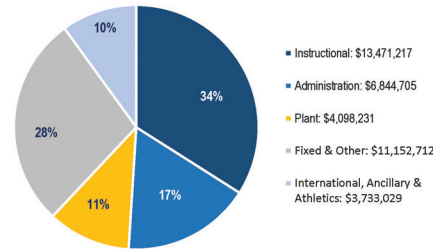
